B. Developing Day care centre in the centres

a) Lamontville Good News Day care centres

Volunteers continue to do Baking day on Monday and extension lessons on Wednesday following the themes outlined in the syllabus.

Mother's day, Valentine's day and Easter were celebrated with special activities. A highlight was a visit to Ushaka aquarium and Mitchel Park Zoo

A grade R program was introduced and is running well. COPT keeps stocking the room with educational equipment – puzzles, simple board games, matching cards, peg boards, counters etc. as funds become available. It is encouraging to see the teachers use the equipment.

b) Marrianhill Good News Day care centre

Volunteers visit and support the centre on Tuesday and Wednesday. They providing extension lessons together with craft and baking activities.

A new teacher has been appointed to help the present teacher due to the increase in numbers to the centre.

A structured program for the older children is provided teaching them the basic concepts for school readiness. A highlight was a visit to Ushaka aquarium and Mitchel Park Zoo

c) Margate Good News Day care centre

Volunteers visit the centre when available to support the crèche with their activities. The crèche has enjoyed outings to the crocodile farm and the petting zoo.

d) Candu Good News Day care centre

Volunteers visit the centre when available offering support.

C. Open more Bible Education centers

COPT manages and rents a shop in Durban central providing Bibles and other inspiring literature to build you, family and community. COPT has purchased a container to place at the Lamontville community centre. The container is presently a library as well as a Bible Education centre. The library has a variety of books of all genres and for different age groups. The library also stocks study aids for grade 10 - 12. At present the library is open 1 day a week and is well supported.

D. Provide Occupational, Physio, Speech Therapy and support at the Mason Lincoln School

- a) **OT Therapy room** –This has been erected on the Mason Lincoln school premises in 2014. The room has been equipped with OT equipment. Volunteers continue to visit the OT room 2x a week offering OT related exercises.
- b) The OT room has been offered to social workers working at the school when the volunteers are not using the class as a full time Occupational therapist has not yet been appointed. More equipment and exercise balls have been purchased to aid with OT exercises.
- c) Physio and Speech Therapy room Equipment has been bought to start stocking the physio room. Parallel bars, a double low plinth bed, exercise balls, balancing beam, wedges and a pediatric standing frame. The room is also being painted out, mirrors hung and curtains made to divide the room for privacy. The two Physio Therapists that were appointed by the school in 2014 are now actively involved with physio therapy and are guiding us with the needs of the physio room.
- d) **Computer classes** Depending on availability of volunteers basic computer Literacy is provided to the high school students.
- e) A number of **fun days** were organized for the children at the school. Volunteers visited the school on a Saturday offering craft, baking, face and nail painting and sport activities. These mornings are always enjoyed by the kids.

We believe that having these funds available has motivated the youth to work hard as we have offered some kind of hope for now and the future.

I. Trade School

The trade school has closed due to no volunteers to run the school. 1 student who has come through the trade school has been employed by COPT to do maintenance work at all our centres. He is also offering short DIY courses at the different centres.

J. Upgrades in the surrounding communities

The quad area of the school was painted with colourful murals. The cemented area was painted with various outdoor games e.g. hopscotch, snakes and ladders etc.

d) Mason Lincoln Braille room

Tables, chairs and storage cupboards were purchased for this room to make it functional to teach in

e) Replaced home that was burnt down

A student presently doing matric and a supporter of the Good News centre in Lamontville house was burnt down. COPT helped with food, clothing and purchased a ready-made 2 room structure to replace his home.

f) Margate Good News centre upgrade

A group of volunteers visited the centre to upgrade the interior, kitchen area and outdoor area

g) Lamontville Good News Library and BEC

The container has been secured with burglar guards and security gate so that a computer can be kept in the container.

K. Feeding Schemes

Kwadebeka clinic was identified as a place to provide a healthy cup of soup and fruit to patients waiting for treatment. Many of the patients have been sitting in the queues since 4 in the morning. A soup kitchen has also been set up at the Lamontville and Clermont Good News centres. Soup is served one day a week to those in the surrounding community.

L. Learn to Earn

A cupboard has been purchased and stocked with non-perishable foods. Maize meal, rice food, tin food and toiletries. Children who want to be part of the program have filled in a registration form. Once they have registered they are given a point form. There are different methods of earning points.

2.3. How our objectives were achieved:

A. Developing the Good News Centers

Programs were introduced at the centers depending on the availably of volunteers. Adult skill courses were advertised in the surrounding area of the community center.

B. Developing Day care in the centers

Providing continual support to the crèches has proved to be motivational to the staff. The staff has grown more confident in their lesson structure and presentation. Visiting the crèches twice a week has been beneficial to both child and teacher.

C. Open more Bible Education centers

The Lamontville BEC has been opened and is manned 4 days a week offering free correspondence courses learning to read the Bible. It also offers counseling and moral support to those in the community.

D. Provide Occupational, Physio and Speech Therapy and support at the Mason Lincoln School

Donations to make therapy available at the school have come in steadily. COPT is building and equipping the OT room as well as the physio room as funds are made available. A number of fun days were organized to entertain the children on Saturdays.

E. Build relationships with schools

COPT has visited the schools in close proximity to our community centers and offered our services to the schools. The schools have warmly welcomed embracing and supporting projects we have introduced at the schools.

F. Providing opportunities for corporate companies to provide funding for COPT projects

COPT has produced a number of promotional videos showcasing a number of the projects that COPT is involved in. COPT has visited a number of corporate and private companies requesting donations to either sustain a project or start a new project.

G. President Award Program

The President Award Program for youth offers a constructive program for youth to follow guiding them into building both themselves and the community. COPT contacted the organisers of the President Award Program explained our vision for the youth that we are involved with and they have welcomed COPT youth on board the program.

H. Education Fund

A presentation was put together outlining the need for an educational fund. Many of the youth that we come in contact with come from dire poverty situations. The presentation was sent out to possible donors and funding has been received.

I. Trade School

J. Upgrades in the surrounding communities

When funding was available COPT would identify a crèche or school that needed an upgrade. A team of volunteers would be sent out to do the upgrade.

K. Feeding Schemes

Volunteers make the soup and buy the fruit to hand out to patients at Kwadebeka clinic and at Clermont and Lamontville centres. The feeding schemes are well supported.

L. Learn to earn

A cupboard has been purchased and stocked with non-perishable foods. Maize meal, rice food, tin food and toiletries. Children who want to be part of the program have filled in a registration form. Once they have registered they are given a point form. There are different methods of earning points.

A stamp is put on their point form. Once they have accumulated enough points they can spend their points shopping from the stocked cupboard.

2.4. Ways in which beneficiaries benefited from our projects/programs

A. Developing the Good News Centers

The community centers have become well supported by the surrounding community. The community that COPT serves has voiced their appreciation.

B. Developing Crèches in the centers

The crèches provide a stimulating and safe environment for children who otherwise would be left at home. The majority of the children that attend the crèche live in informal settlements. The crèche also provides two balanced meals a day.

C. Open more Bible Education centers

COPT now have two Bible Education centres one in the city centre and Lamontville

D. Provide Occupational, Physio, Speech Therapy and support at the Mason Lincoln School

The Mason Lincoln School for special needs children had provided no therapy. Much needed therapy is now possible; Useful equipment has been purchased and has motivated the staff because of COPT's support. COPT's consistent visits to the school have built many relationships with the children.

E. Build relationships with schools

The schools supported by COPT have appreciated our support. Both teachers and children enjoy and have learnt a lot from our support.

F. Getting Companies in helping us with funding for our projects

Money, time and resources that have been donated for COPT projects have gone to helping out communities where there is a need.
